# Music development plan summary: Charmouth Primary School

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

#### Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Charmouth Primary School children have timetabled curriculum music teaching of at least one hour each week of the school year for Reception to year 6. We use Charanga as a scheme of work and resource to support high quality and sequential music curriculum for all children. The curriculum is informed by the model music curriculum.

Within lessons children have the opportunity to sing as whole groups, in small groups and solos as part of their curriculum learning. They also use a range of instruments within the Charanga scheme lesson plans, giving children a wide range of experience playing individuals and as part of an ensemble.

We work with Dorset Music Hub to access instruments for teaching, CPD and support for teachers.

In accordance with the Equality Act 2010 and the Special Needs and Disability Regulations 2014, the learning in music is provided for all pupils in the school, including those with special educational needs. Lesson planning by teachers and subject leaders ensures that learning in accessible for all: agile, adaptive approaches to learning allow all learners to focus upon the most important small steps in each lesson.

#### Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Charmouth Primary School we are passionate about developing co-curricular opportunities for music. We have a talented peripatetic teacher, Tim Linsley, from West Country Music offering instrument lessons to children. He offers clarinet, flute, cornet, alto saxophone, trombone, guitar, keyboard, piano, violin and recorder. Currently he teaches peripatetic to approximately 10 children across the school.

Year 3 and 4 have an annual music project which they work on with external teachers. In 2024-25 children will learn an instrument, initially samba drums, in teacher led class based lessons. The samba drums are rented from the Dorset Music Hub.

There are currently no ensembles within the school day for in extra-curricular activities but this is something we would like to develop.

We regularly share opportunities for external opportunities run within our community and locally with children and their families. For example, B-Sharp in Lyme Regis is a local choir which several children attend outside school hours.

Dorset music Hub provides access to instruments which are used within school for curriculum and performance learning. The school curriculum is led by the scheme Charanga and CPD is available for teachers to access.

A local musician, Pete Wild, attends school to lead singing assemblies through Autumn term in preparation for Harvest and Carol service. This is a valuable opportunity for children to both hear live performance and to work together in class and whole school ensembles towards regular performances. The children perform during Harvest, Nativity, Easter and the end of year Production.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

As a school we are keen to facilitate as many opportunities for children to experience music in a range of forms.

Singing Assembly happens weekly and is teacher led. Songs are selected from Charanga and some external to this where appropriate for times of the year, festivals and topical factors for children's wider learning.

We have a number of annual festivals and celebrations in which children learn and perform music to the rest of the school, their families and the wider community. Harvest festival is hosted in school. Families and local residential care home residents are invited to attend. Children from all year groups sing and showcase songs.

We run a carol concert in the local Church, which the whole community is invited to. Children from the whole school sing together a group, and each class performs a song. Where they have been learning an instrument they often perform with these too as an end point celebration for their instrument learning.

Children in Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 learn and perform a Nativity to the school and their families. We also have an Easter picnic where songs are performed and a Summer Production created and performed by KS2 with songs.

We are keen for children to experience a range of musical performances. Currently there is an annual pantomime performed in school by a Theatre Company.

As a school we plan to develop our wider music offer and enable more children to access musical experiences outside of their curriculum learning. We plan to develop a

Choir or music group in 2024-25. We are planning to increase opportunities for those learning an instrument in school to showcase their learning, possibly by performing in assemblies, and playing welcome and exit music.

We plan to increase the number of opportunities that children have to watch live performances of music, either in classes or as a whole school.

Plans for curriculum development are in place including CPD access for more staff around the use of Charanga and using Music across the curriculum. The music lead is planning to explore further incorporation of music within other areas of the curriculum, Further CPD and support will be sought for this element of our next steps.

We are planning to further explore opportunities with local schools and our Multi Academy Trust music leads.
